



Overview: 2013/14 Total Children and Parents Served




Children, Parents & Providers Served by Program: 2013/14






Age of Children Served 2013/14






Ethnicity of Children Served 2013/14





- "I didn't know that there was that much sugar in sodas." (10 sugar cubes in a 12oz. can of Coca Cola)




Mobile Dental Clinic Services

 - 15 referrals out for additional service




Mobile Dental Clinic: Preventive Services 2013/14

Mobile Dental Clinic Success Story

In March 2014, the Mobile Dental Clinic had a child come to the MDC for his first checkup. He turned out to be a very high risk case. Along with multiple dental issues, he did not have insurance. With his family not being documented we were unable to help him to obtain MediCal. With the help from First 5 Tehama and NVIH funds we were able to treat this child. With 8 visits and through two counties, 12 caries were completed on this child.

Thanks to First 5 Tehama and the MDC, more than \$1,500 worth of dental services were provided to this child free of charge.




CARES Plus Participant Outcomes

- 100% met with Professional Growth Advisor at least twice
- 67% said Professional Growth Advisor was extremely helpful
 - 14% somewhat helpful; 5% neutral; 14% no response
- 57% rated their computer skills as Proficient or Advanced by the end of the year
- ▶ 81% had high speed internet at home
- > 29% used technical support from First 5 Tehama





- 100% of parents would recommend program to other parents
- ▶ 100% rated teachers as excellent





School Readiness Survey: How Parents Heard About the Program




School Readiness Survey: Parent Satisfaction

School Readiness Success Story

A School Readiness Project home visitor was working with a mother with two children who had no transportation and refused to use the bus (TRAX). She was very fearful of not arriving to the destination and the schedule and language barriers were confusing to her. The home visitor was transporting her to her children's doctor and dentist appointments. The home visitor convinced her to use the bus, with support and encouragement and by riding the bus with her.

Now, she is riding the bus frequently to go to all of her appointments in Red Bluff. She tells other moms all about how easy it is to use the bus.

School Readiness Success Story

(Continued)

The home visitor did an ASQ on her four year old son and noticed that he was very low in the speech area so she referred him to the Department of Education. He was assessed and began to receive therapy. There were ongoing issues with transportation to the therapy appointments. The home visitor continued working with both of them and was able to get the school bus to provide transportation so he could attend speech therapy. With weekly speech therapy, his speech is improving. He is talking a lot and is also trying to speak English now.

School Readiness Success Story

(Continued)

He is four years old and not able to attend preschool because they do not have transportation. The family is receiving home visits and mom makes sure that they are attending our weekly play groups and she reads, sings and tells stories every day to him and his baby brother with the home visitor's continued reminders and encouragement. The family is also trying to speak English now.

- Results for seven years: 2007/08 through 2013/14
- ▶ 550 surveys in 2013/14
- Improved access to health care
- Improved access to oral health and ECE programs in Corning



School Readiness: Kindergarten Transition Survey (Continued)

- Increase in percent of entering K students in Gerber/Los Molinos with formal ECE experience
- KinderCamp as sole ECE experience declined in Gerber and Los Molinos
- Slight increase in children with no prior ECE in Gerber and Los Molinos






Entering Kindergarten Students: Have Health Insurance






Entering Kindergarten Students: Physical Exam Prior to Entry








Entering Kindergarten Students: Oral Health Exam Prior to Entry






Entering Kindergarten Students: Participated in Head Start, State Preschool or Private Preschool






Entering Kindergarten Students: No Prior Early Learning Experience

Themes

School Readiness

- Large numbers of home visits, ASQ assessments and participation in classes and playgroups
- Improved health access for core families
- Improved family literacy practices for core families
- Addition of AmeriCorps members expanded the services offered
- 70% heard about the program from friend, family, agency or schools
- Parental satisfaction is high



Themes (continued)

- Students served by School Readiness entering Kindergarten:
 - More likely to have access to health care
 - More likely to have oral health care
 - More likely to have formal early childhood education
- Many students without Preschool or Head Start in School Readiness sites and Red Bluff Elementary
