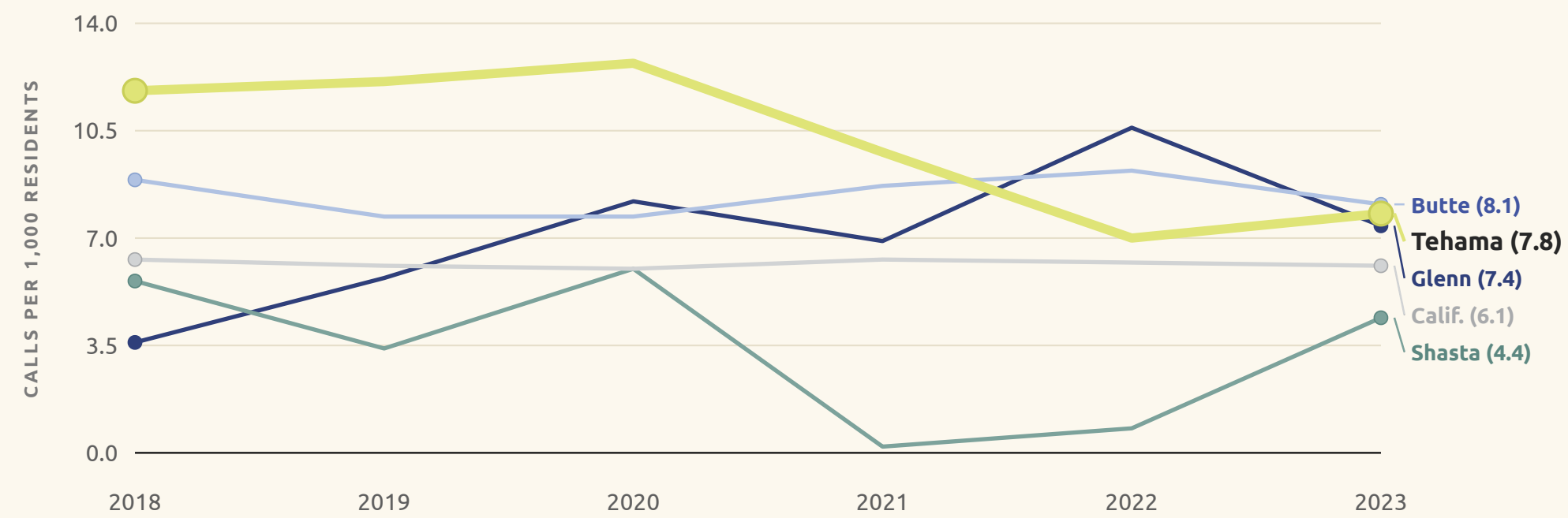

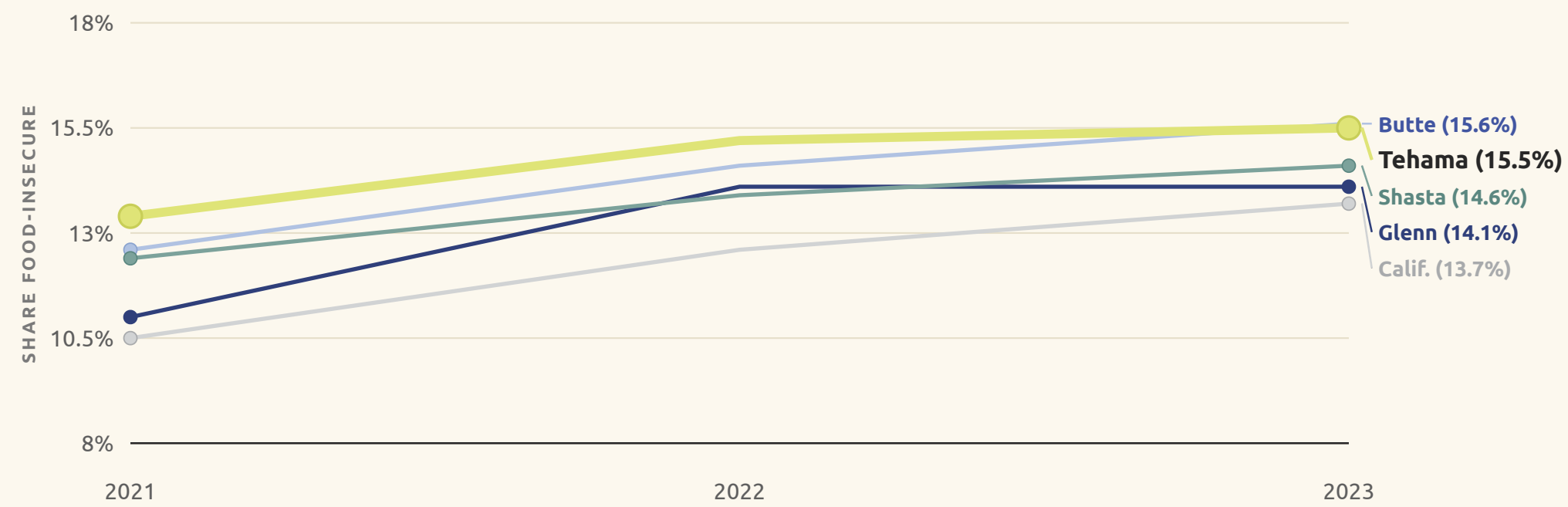
Six measures of the economic ground families stand on and the types of trauma they may experience in their lives.

WHY THIS MATTERS

Domestic violence is a leading driver of childhood ACEs and a predictor of crisis-service demand. Children who witness violence at home are significantly more likely to experience it in their own adult relationships.

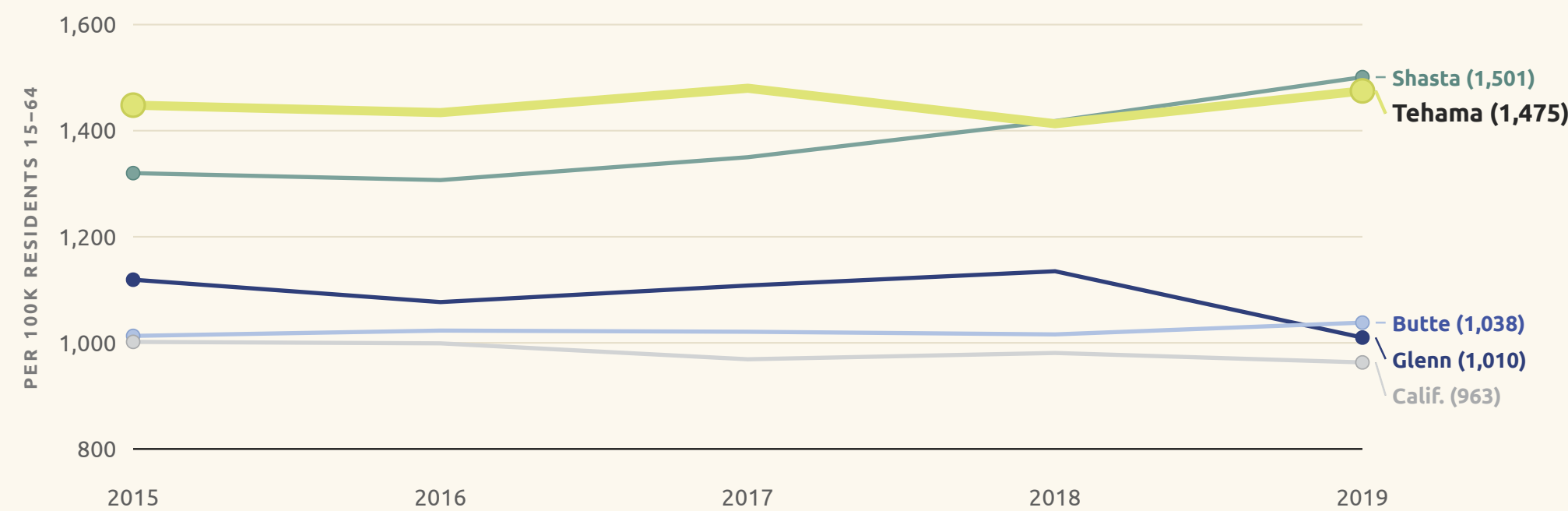

WHY THIS MATTERS

Food insecurity is both a symptom of poverty and an independent stressor that drives poor physical and mental health outcomes. For service providers, it often signals household instability across multiple domains, and is one of the strongest predictors of whether a family will reach crisis.

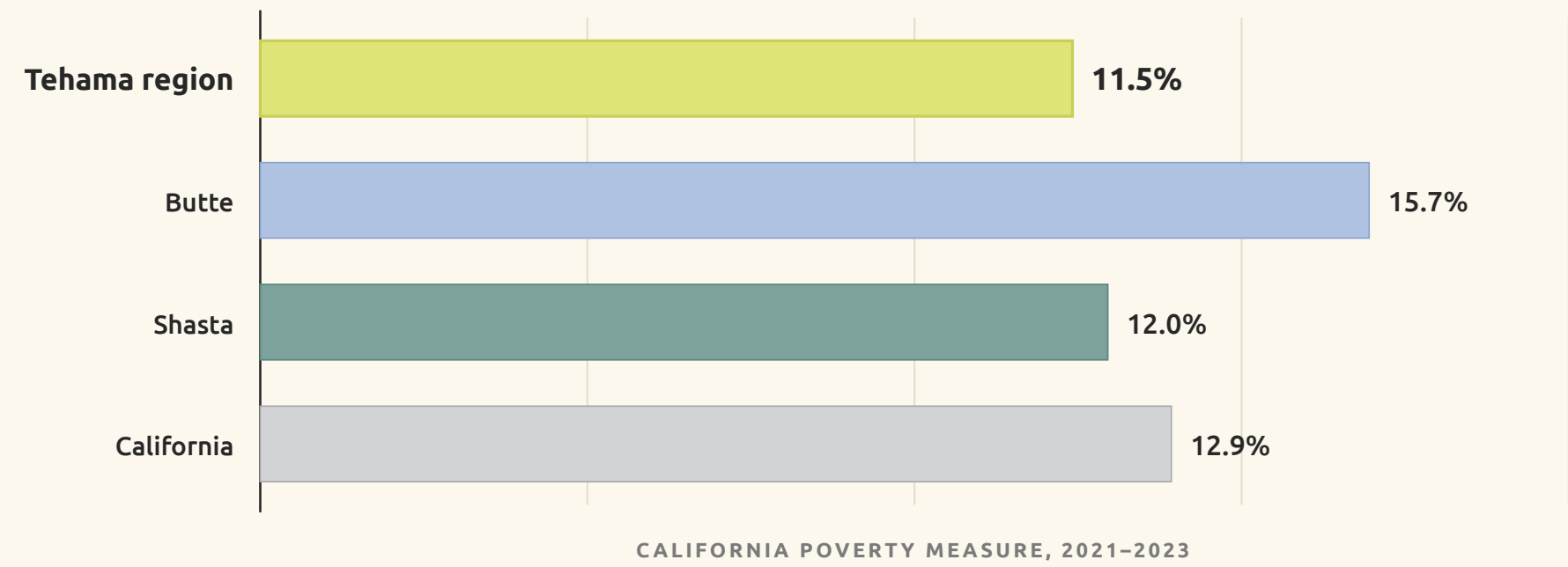

WHY THIS MATTERS

High incarceration rates signal unmet need for behavioral health, substance use, and economic support services, and create a steady stream of individuals returning to the community with complex, often unaddressed needs.

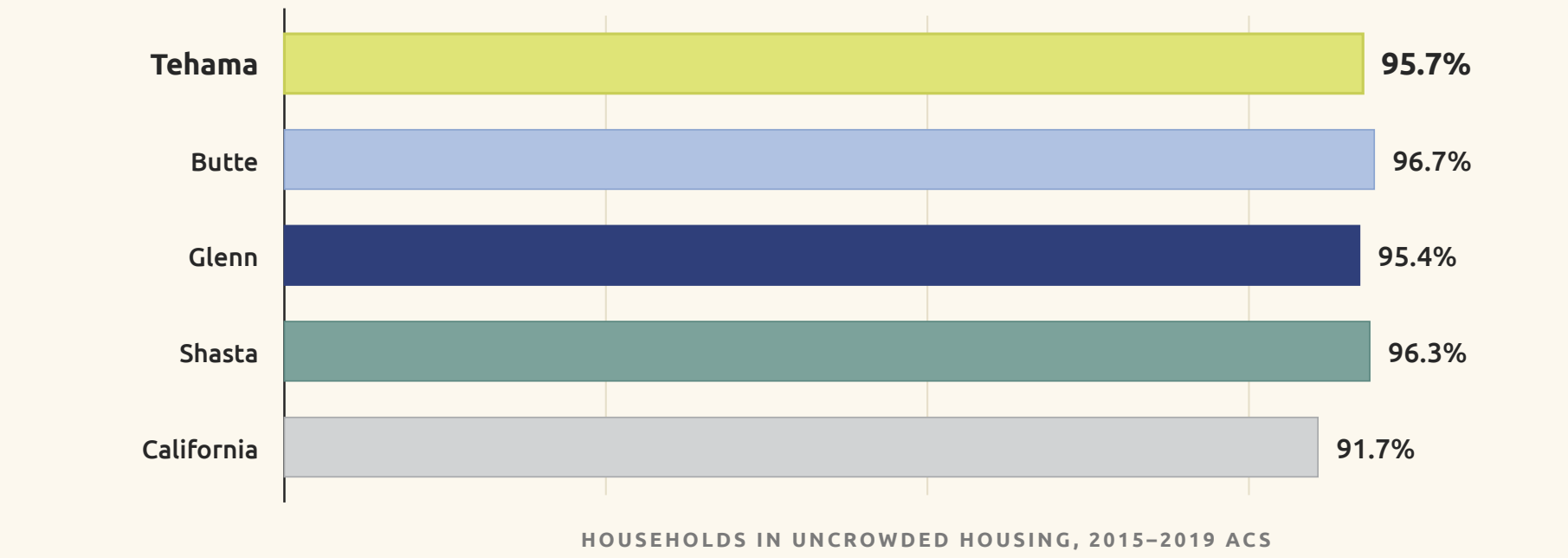

WHY THIS MATTERS

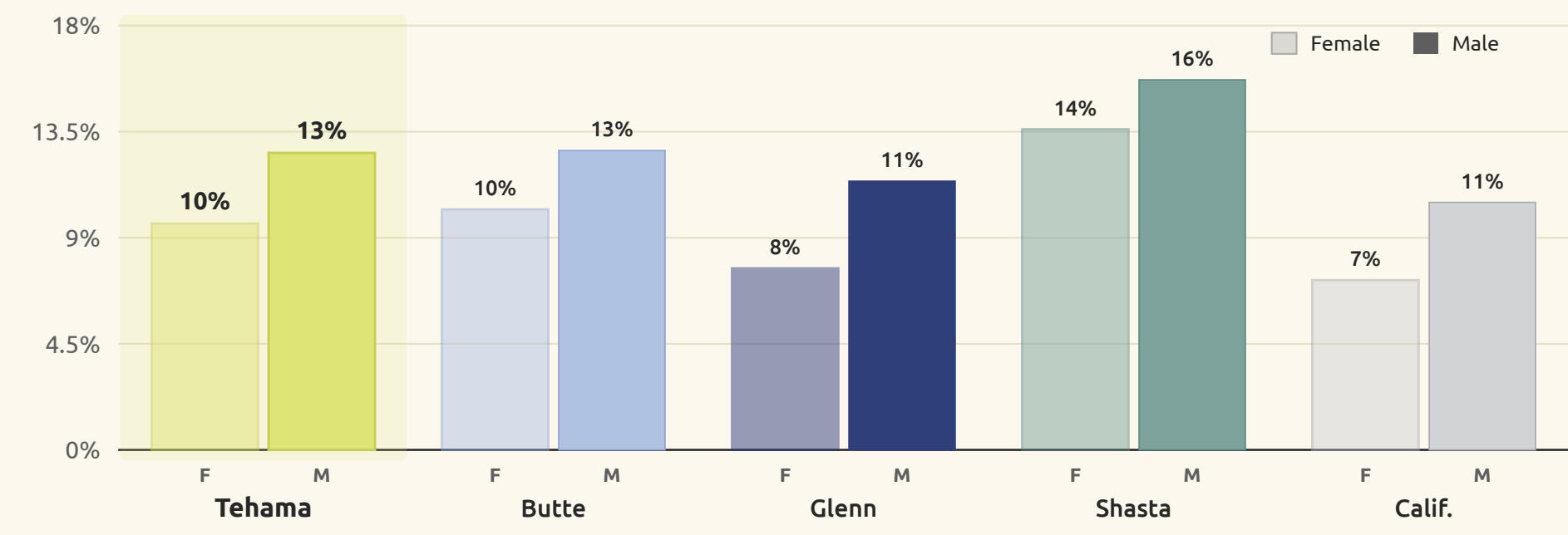
Poverty is the single strongest predictor of service utilization across systems – child welfare, emergency health, behavioral health, housing, and food assistance.

WHY THIS MATTERS

Crowded housing is one of the most underreported dimensions of housing instability. Families double and triple up to avoid homelessness, making the problem invisible to systems that may only count formal shelter entries.

WHY THIS MATTERS

Divorce rates can reflect many factors, including the cumulative pressure that poverty, housing instability, substance use, and domestic violence place on families — making elevated rates worth examining alongside other community stressors.
